FROM A PLACE OF HOPE

Our current sociopolitical reality is characterized by narratives and practices of lies and cruelty. We are all outraged to see how violence, the use of power, and disrespect for life are infecting our already divided society, made vulnerable by our deep divisions about our identity as a diverse community and our lack of recognition for our historical past. This is what stands in our way as we aspire to build a more just, equitable, and humane present and future.

Our social media and discourses are being filled with a false Christianity that bets on white supremacy and has no roots in the authentic Christian values and practices of justice, mercy, love, or compassion.

From our Quaker tradition, we cannot be indifferent to pain or injustice. Our convictions lead us to advocate for a community where each person is respected and recognized as a bearer of that divine force. Where each of us is capable of loving, of being better, and of accompanying each other as we grow.

It is from this deeply rooted conviction that I dare to say we cannot be indifferent to the cruelty we have witnessed. How peaceful protesters such as Renee Good and Alex Pretti have been vilely murdered while exercising their constitutional right to protest. How more than 30 people have died in ICE facilities from January 2025 to the present.

In the face of these events, if my faith does not move me to indignation, to compassion, and to action, I must examine whether I am falling into stagnation or whether I am being called to be a witness to the transformative power that leads us to dialogue and practices that build peace, well-being, and justice.



He has been the lead caregiver for children ages 0-5 since September. He is a junior at Thunderbird High School.

His favorite subject is World History/US History. He wants to be a History Teacher or a Pharmaceutical researcher. I asked what led him to Pharmaceutical research and he shared that there were a lot of doctors in his family, and he is really into chemistry, so those 2 things make him think of Pharmaceutical research.

FIRST DAY SCHOOL AND CHILDCARE

First Day School met on January 18th, and everyone was happy to be back together again. We plan to meet on the 3rd Sunday of every month through May, with an additional Sunday a month, if more than one family can attend, and a teacher is available. Please watch the weekly email the Saturday before to find out if FDS is meeting.

Our childcare for children ages 0-5 is growing and is available most Sundays through the end of May, unless otherwise noted on the calendar. ***Because of this, we are in need of an adult volunteer every Sunday. Please consider volunteering one Sunday between now and the end of May for childcare.*** Please contact Kari at acumoxamama@gmail.com or 585-315-5155 (text or call) and let her know which Sunday you would like to volunteer.

What is required of the Volunteer:

Arrive by 9:45am and stay until the parents have picked their children up from the childcare room, hopefully by 11:15. Do not bring the children into the meeting, their parents can bring them.

With Jackson as the lead caregiver, the volunteer is to assist in engaging and interacting with the children, and caring for them.

Help to clean and organize the room, without disrupting the children.

Parents are to be notified via text message if the caregivers need help with the child because the child is inconsolable, or otherwise in need of their parent. IF the child needs a diaper change or to be taken to the bathroom, the caregivers will notify the parents to come and take them to the bathroom. *Caregivers are not to take the children to the bathroom.*

There is a list of parents' names and phone numbers taped to the wall in the childcare room.
